Community and Economic Development

2019 was another successful year for the Community and Economic Development Division. In all, NWAEDD was responsible for writing and administering \$4,639,953.00 in grant awards throughout the region in 2019. These projects come about in a variety of different ways, but all successful endeavors are a result of collaboration with and the perseverance of our wonderful member cities & counties. It is our pleasure to serve each of our 81 member entities and it's the relationships with the people involved that make sharing these success stories such a pleasure. The following paragraphs detail some of our successes.



NWAEDD continued its strong partnership with the Economic Development Administration in 2019 through two major grant awards for the cities of Harrison and Berryville. Harrison was awarded \$1,660,000.00 for its Goblin Drive project. The improvements include a new bridge crossing Dry Jordan Creek, widening Goblin Drive, and reconfiguring the intersection of Goblin Drive & Industrial Park Road. Berryville received a \$1.5 million grant for infrastructure improvements to its new industrial park including streets, drainage, and wastewater.

2019 was a very active year working with our counterparts at the Arkansas Economic Development Commission (AEDC) through the efforts of Catherine Baker, the District's new Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) administrator. The City of Leslie was awarded \$147,500.00 for drainage and sidewalk improvements and Eureka Springs was awarded \$221,500.00 for a wastewater rehabilitation effort. Six (6) new CDBG projects were started in 2019 as well with the cities of Elkins, Gentry, Flippin, Lincoln, Mountain Home, and Yellville. Those applications will be submitted in the Spring of 2020. NWAEDD also remained active with AEDC's Rural Services Division by totaling \$316,463.00 in grant awards. Grantees included the communities of



Briarcliff, Compton, Elm Springs, Evansville, Garfield, Lakeview, Maysville, Mount Judea, St. Paul, Yellville, and the South Carroll County Fire District. These grants helped renovate community centers, purchase firefighting equipment, and make various other improvements.

Community and Economic Development



Tina M. Cole, Community and Economic Development Coordinator, continued her strong efforts in promoting the Outdoor Grant Program offered by the Arkansas Department of Parks and Tourism. Tina worked with the City of Mountain Home to secure a \$96,500.00 grant for playground and ballpark improvements, along with a \$50,000.00 grant for the City of Cotter to construct a playground. She also leads our efforts in pursuing and administering a variety of ongoing FEMA grants.

Other exciting happenings included the City of Marshall's \$231,770.00 Delta Regional Authority Grant for wastewater improvements, a \$132,500.00 award from Arkansas Department of Emergency Management (ADEM) for the Osage Creek Bridge in Carroll County, securing USDA-Community Facility Grants for Berryville and Yellville, continued work on multiple FEMA hazard mitigation plans, and participating in a variety of conferences that benefit our members. All in all, 2019 was another great year and special thanks go to all our members that helped make it such a success. We hope to continue to build on these successes and further strengthen our communities in 2020!

Workforce Development Success Stories

Success Story by Beverly Taylor, Harrison Career Advisor

The In-School Youth program has always been my passion during my years of working with all our programs. I could go on and on listing the many participants that come to mind when talking about success. Conducting Job Clubs, teaching them good work ethics, leadership and citizenship skills, financial literacy and many other life skills that have helped to

make them successful.



Austin Wilson enrolled in the In-School Youth program at the beginning of his 10th grade year at Bruno Pyatt. He worked at the school as a janitor assistant in the afternoons and during the summer. His desire to work and please his supervisors were traits that I noticed early. Due to having gained valuable work experience through our program, Austin was able to obtain a job on his own at McDonald's in Harrison at the end of 11th grade. He continued to work for McDonald's during his senior year and after graduation, receiving many promotions and becoming a department manager, during the 4 years he worked there

In 2015, Austin was hired as a teller by Arvest Bank in Harrison. Once again, his work ethic and people pleasing personality have brought him much success. His promotions have been to the positions of senior teller, CPU processor and recently Assistant Branch Manager.

Austin is active in many civic organizations including Rotary, Music on the Square Board in Yellville, Marion County Young Republicans and has also worked as an intern for Congressman Steve Womack.

Did the opportunity that the Workforce program gave Austin make a difference? "Sure, it did! The work experience, the guidance and encouragement when I was in school helped me make better decisions about my future. My parents also were a huge influence, they never had to force me to work, I wanted to work" says Austin. As a career advisor for this young man I can say it has been a privilege to work with him and even better to sit back now and watch him grow in a career in which he excels.

Success Story by Michelle Ryan, Harrison Career Advisor

Heather Blackwell came to the workforce center in Harrison after her place of employment went out of business and left her without a job and income. Her husband's job was the only stable income they had.

They had a hobby of taking old items and flipping them into something new and then selling those items or custom make items to sell that would aid in financial help. Heather and her husband would plan a strict budget and stick to it weekly and monthly to support them after the loss of her job.

Heather decided that it was time to go back to college and start a new career. She contacted financial aid and was referred to the local workforce office to ask about assistance for dislocated workers. She was provided with all the necessary paperwork and was walked through the application process. She was placed in a program that paid for a huge portion of her degree and allowed her family to manage financially so that she could focus on her studies.



She completed two years at North Arkansas College and then transferred to Arkansas Tech University and graduated with a bachelor's degree in Early Elementary Education with a 4.0 GPA on May 12, 2018. She was able to gain employment as a second-grade teacher at Bergman School District. With this education she was given the opportunity to move into yet another new challenge, teaching gifted and talented students. This new role required specific certifications and she is now half-way through her master's degree program with a projected completions date in December of 2020.



Workforce Development Success Stories

Dawning of a new day



Dawn Bissell became a displaced worker on May 31, 2019, when her previous employer, Sister's Health Boutique of Mercy Health, permanently closed. Dawn loved helping women as a Certified Mastectomy Fitter. She was very disappointed when notice was given the company would be closing. Dawn began job searching all over Northwest Arkansas and the surrounding cities to find an employer who needed her skills and expertise but found none.

She realized that she needed a plan of action to gain employment using a new set of work skills. Dawn believed going back to school to receive training and education in a demand occupation would help her be more marketable in the workplace and get a job with comparable wages she was making in her previous position.


After meeting and discussing training options available with WIOA Career Advisor, Ms. Wilkinson, Dawn was encouraged to find it was very possible for her to get a

job close to her previous wages earned in a 9-week short term program. Dawn and Ms. Wilkinson developed an Individual Employment Plan for Dawn to reach her employment goal. The plan of action was Dawn pursuing an Administrative Assistant Certificate through the U of a Global Campus, update her resume and apply for jobs. The Administrative Assistant Program was a perfect fit for Dawn because it was a short term-9-week program and she already possessed some administrative skills. The course would afford Dawn an opportunity to refresh and upskill her knowledge in business administration and find a great paying job right away.

Thanks to WIOA support, Dawn completed the program and was able to achieve her employment goal and obtain a job with self-sufficient wages as a Help Desk Representative for National Cash Registers. Dawn was very pleased with the WIOA program and thanked Ms. Wilkinson for going above and beyond as a Career Advisor.

Teaching Skills that Matter

Arkansas was one of 5 states chosen for a national pilot program with a goal of improving the effectiveness of adult education instruction in the areas of civics education, digital literacy, financial literacy, health literacy and workforce preparation. Cherie Connor, Director of Adult Education at North Arkansas College (NAC), Ben Aldama, Dean of Adult Education at Northwest Arkansas Community College (NWACC) and Robbie Cornelius, Director of Adult Education from the Fayetteville School District were three of the four teachers selected to participate in Arkansas.



Bi-Annual State Partners Meeting

The Northwest Core Four Partners participated in the Biannual State Partners meeting in Little Rock, Arkansas in September. During the two-day conference participants attended breakout sessions, heard speakers on various programs and had a great time networking with partners from all over the state. Partners from each area met and created an update to their SWOT analysis. Each area then presented a report to the conference attendees about the results of their meeting.



North Arkansas Transportation Services




North Arkansas Transportation Service (NATS) is the public transportation division of Northwest Arkansas Economic Development District.

This program is funded through the Federal Transit Administration's 5311 program and those funds are administered through the Arkansas Department of Transportation. NATS has both interstate and intrastate route authority and serves the counties of Baxter, Boone, Carroll, Fulton, Izard, Madison, Marion, Newton, and Searcy Counties.

NATS has been in operation since March of 1981. NATS started primarily as an affordable transportation service to help rural citizens get to and from work. The program's operation has dramatically expanded over the years. During 2019 NATS' fleet of 56 vehicles traveled a total of 734,945 miles. Over time, the expansion of services has led to a broad range of routes provided which include:

- **Demand Response Routes—**Through the demand response service, clients can be transported to their desired destination by scheduling rides 24 hours in advance.
- **Partnered Routes**—The Learning Center of North Arkansas, Boone County Special Services, and Medicaid brokers (Southeastrans) transportation for Medicaid recipients.
- **Commuter Routes**—Partnership with area manufacturers and businesses that offers transportation to employees. In 2019 there were 4,560 trips provided to worksites.



The division did experience some staff changes in 2019. JoAnna Cartwright, who was the NATS Director for nearly 34 years, retired in June of 2019. Her years of dedicated service did not go unnoticed, and she will be missed by many. The new NATS Director, Jack Chisum, was welcomed, and he has been a great asset to the team. Jack has been able to transition into the role and pick up where she left off.

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
